TIME ALONE WITH GOD (TAG)

The last section has spoken in general terms of the putting off of the old life characterized by ignorance, vanity and deceit, and so impurity and lust. In its place there must be put on the new man, that means a new way of life characterized by holiness and righteousness. In this section the apostle turns to speak quite specifically of the sins that are to be put off, and the positive qualities or types of action that must be found in the Christian's life.

Another mark of the old nature is plain bad temper, unjustified anger. Quoting the Old Testament again, the LXX of Psalm iv. 4, he says, *Be ye angry, and sin not*. The English rendering 'Stand in awe, and sin not' gives a different turn to it. There is anger which is righteous anger, such as we see in our Lord Himself; but His anger never led to sin, because His emotions were kept under perfect control.

Turning to another characteristic of the old life, at least in some of his readers, he says *let him that stole steal no more...* The Christian motive for earning is not merely to have enough for oneself and one's own, and then perhaps for comforts and luxuries, but to have to give to those in need. The Christian philosophy of labour is thus lifted far above the thought of what is right or fair in the economic field; it is lifted to the place where there is no room for selfishness or the motive of personal profit at all. Giving becomes the motive for getting.

Francis Foulkes. The Epistle of Paul to the Ephesians, pp.132-135 (1956)

Throughout this section runs the idea that the Christian is not merely to be emptied of evil. His life is to be filled with good. "Whereby putting away lying, speak every man truth with his neighbor: for we are members one of the other" (v. 25).

The force of "putting away [off] lying" is that of one full sweep of being rid of it. Gentiles had certain principles concerning honesty, but their practice belied their teachings. Lying to each other was one of their besetting sins. Over against this Christians are to have the habit of speaking truth to each other. Christians are members of a *fellowship*, and this relationship can truly exist only where deceit is not practiced.

"Be angry" and "sin not" are both commands. There are some things about which the Christian should be angry, such as sin and injustice, but he should not sin in taking it out on the sinner. One may act in an unchristian way in opposing evil. If he does so, he himself stoops to evil.

Herschel H. Hobbs, New Men In Christ, pp. 85f (1974).

Verses 17-24 have urged Christians to abandon totally all the practices of Gentile society which spring from unredeemed human nature, and instead to let their new, Christ-given nature, control all they do. The writer now moves on to indicate some of the positive directions in which the new nature will express itself differently from the old one. The counsel given falls predominantly into a series of contrasts. First, that aspect of the old nature is named which is to be avoided, and then, to offset it, the corresponding good which must replace it,

The apostle Paul counsels, "Be angry but do not sin; do not let the sun go down on your anger, and do not make room for the devil" (Ephesians 4:26-27). By saying "be angry" Paul is not encouraging anger. He recognizes it is a part of life, and instead of repressing it he instructs that we should not let the sun go down on our anger. Archibald Hart explains, "Paul is saying here that it is not the anger itself (the feeling) that is wrong, but that anger has the potential for leading you into sin. To feel anger, to tell someone that you feel angry, and to talk about your anger are both healthy and necessary."

When we let the sun go down on our anger, we allow it to poison our souls. This is why Paul follows with the warning "do not make room for the devil." The Greek word for "room" is *topos*, which means 'place or footing.' Unexpressed and unresolved anger give the enemy a foothold to work from. Anger easily can be turned in to resentment (Why does she always neglect me? or He always gets what I deserve) and despair (Life is unfair, why even try?). So we need to examine the cause of our anger. Perhaps it is righteous anger, which can lead us to correct an injustice. The vast majority of my anger is unrighteous and is a natural outgrowth of the FINS (False Imperative Narratives) I have to fight.

We have considered four major secular trend that threaten to engulf the Christian community. In the face of these we are all called not to feeble-minded conformity but to radical nonconformity. Over against the challenge of pluralism, we are to be a community of truth, standing up for the uniqueness of Jesus Christ. Over against the challenge of materialism, we are to be a community of simplicity and pilgrimage. Over against the challenge of relativism, we are to be a community of obedience. Over against the challenge of narcissism, we are to be a community of love.

You see what is happening. The Christ Himself, the Son of God who is man (just like you) and God (just like His Father) is actually at your side and is already at that moment beginning to turn your pretence into a reality. This is not merely a fancy way of saying that your conscience is telling you what to do. If you simply ask your conscience, you get one result: If you remember that you are dressing up as Christ, you get a different one. There are lots of things which your conscience might not call definitely wrong (especially things in your mind) but which you will see at once you cannot go on doing if you are seriously trying to be like Christ. For you are no longer thinking simply about right and wrong; you are trying to catch the good infection from a Person. It is more like painting a portrait than like obeying a set of rules. And the odd thing is that while in one way it is much harder than keeping rules, in another way it is far easier.
